



## There's no place

### New Home First Program will help seniors stay in their own homes longer!

Clicking the heels of your ruby red shoes is a sure reminder of all those things you love about your own home: your comfy bed where you get the best sleep, your favorite sofa or recliner for reading or watching the tube, familiar spaces decorated and set up to suit your needs, and all those "things" we collect over the years that make us feel safe and comfortable.

Getting older doesn't change how much we love the comfort of our own home, so when a senior's health and independence is threatened we shouldn't expect that they will just walk away from it all.

In fact the opposite is true. When given a choice, most seniors prefer to be at home rather than in a hospital, where they are more comfortable, where there is a lower risk of acquiring an infection, where they are less likely to experience a loss of mobility or function, and where they tend to heal more quickly.

Despite this, many seniors remain in the hospital for long periods of time, in many cases waiting for a vacancy in a nursing home or unable to go back home because they can't get enough care or support in the home. Home First is about to change this.

Home First is a shift in how the health care system thinks and delivers care to seniors. It's about making every effort to support seniors to go home safely after a hospital stay, rather than seeing long-term care as the only option.

Canadian doctors seem to think this is the right way to go. In a recent report by the Canadian Medical Association, is was recommended that, "with the population aging, there is an urgent need to build a system of home-based care to provide families with the support they need to allow patients to get the best care they can at home." Canadian Medical Association. [2011]. Voices into Action - Report on the National Dialogue on Health Care Transformation, Ottawa, ON.

Too often, seniors waiting in hospitals or moving to a nursing home have care needs that could be safely met in the comfort of their own homes. An estimated 37 percent of people in long-term care homes don't need the level of care provided there and could return home.

Beginning this fall, the Erie St. Clair LHIN and Erie St. Clair Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) will be launching Home First in the hospitals, home care, and community support agencies throughout Chatham-Kent, Sarnia-Lambton, and Windsor-Essex. By adopting the Home First philosophy, home will be prioritized as the first and best place to support seniors, with care providers working together to arrange for the right services to make the transition home possible.

To help seniors and their caregivers to feel comfortable and confident to return home, over three million dollars in new funding has been provided to the CCAC to increase home care services.

Additionally, doctors, nurses, and other health care professionals will be educated on Home First and the options available that will safely support seniors to return or remain comfortably in their homes.

In short Home First will:

- respect the wishes of seniors
- get better results for seniors
- make better use of health care services

- ease the pressures on hospitals and reduce ALC rates
- reduce wait times in our hospital emergency rooms

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
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# CK Schaper Sch

An impartial community committee has selected the winners of the 25th Annual Senior Achievement Award. Presentation of the awards took place at a special ceremony Friday, June 17th. during the Chatham-Kent Seniors' Fair at the Blenheim Recreation Centre. Nominations had been sought from citizens across Chatham-Kent.

"This award recognizes outstanding seniors who have made outstanding contribution to the citizens of Chatham-Kent without any purpose of personal gain," said Mayor Randy Hope. 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
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
